- 1 **P** is a solution containing hydrochloric acid, HCl . You are to determine the concentration of HCl in **P** by titrating it against solution **Q**, which is 0.100 mol/dm^3 sodium hydroxide, NaOH . You are then to use **P** to identify solid **R**.

(a) Determination of the concentration of the acid in **P**

Put **P** into the burette.

Pipette a 25.0 cm^3 (or 20.0 cm^3) portion of **Q** into a flask and titrate with **P**, using the indicator provided.

Record your results in the table. Repeat the titration as many times as you consider necessary to achieve consistent results.

- 2 Carry out the following tests on solution **S** and record your observations in the table. You should test and name any gas evolved.

1	Put a portion of S into a boiling-tube and heat gently until the mixture boils.	
2	<p>(a) To a portion of S, slowly add hydrochloric acid until a change is seen.</p> <p>(b) Add excess hydrochloric acid to the mixture from (a).</p>	
3	<p>(a) To a portion of S, add an equal volume of aqueous barium nitrate and allow the mixture to stand for a few minutes.</p> <p>(b) Add nitric acid to the mixture from (a).</p>

4	<p>(a) To a portion of S, add an equal volume of aqueous potassium iodide.</p> <p>(b) Pour a portion of the mixture from (a) into a boiling-tube and add an equal volume of dilute hydrochloric acid and allow the mixture to stand for a few minutes.</p> <p>(c) Slowly add aqueous sodium thiosulphate to the mixture from (b) until there is no further change.</p>

NOTES FOR USE IN QUALITATIVE ANALYSIS

Tests for anions

<i>anion</i>	<i>test</i>	<i>test result</i>
carbonate (CO_3^{2-})	add dilute acid	effervescence, carbon dioxide produced
chloride (Cl^-) [in solution]	acidify with dilute nitric acid, then add aqueous silver nitrate	white ppt.
iodide (I^-) [in solution]	acidify with dilute nitric acid, then add aqueous lead(II) nitrate	yellow ppt.
nitrate (NO_3^-) [in solution]	add aqueous sodium hydroxide then aluminium foil; warm carefully	ammonia produced
sulphate (SO_4^{2-}) [in solution]	acidify with dilute nitric acid, then add aqueous barium nitrate	white ppt.

Tests for aqueous cations

<i>cation</i>	<i>effect of aqueous sodium hydroxide</i>	<i>effect of aqueous ammonia</i>
aluminium (Al^{3+})	white ppt., soluble in excess giving a colourless solution	white ppt., insoluble in excess
ammonium (NH_4^+)	ammonia produced on warming	–
calcium (Ca^{2+})	white ppt., insoluble in excess	no ppt. or very slight white ppt.
copper(II) (Cu^{2+})	light blue ppt., insoluble in excess	light blue ppt., soluble in excess giving a dark blue solution
iron(II) (Fe^{2+})	green ppt., insoluble in excess	green ppt., insoluble in excess
iron(III) (Fe^{3+})	red-brown ppt., insoluble in excess	red-brown ppt., insoluble in excess
zinc (Zn^{2+})	white ppt., soluble in excess giving a colourless solution	white ppt., soluble in excess giving a colourless solution

Tests for gases

<i>gas</i>	<i>test and test result</i>
ammonia (NH_3)	turns damp red litmus paper blue
carbon dioxide (CO_2)	turns limewater milky
chlorine (Cl_2)	bleaches damp litmus paper
hydrogen (H_2)	“pops” with a lighted splint
oxygen (O_2)	relights a glowing splint
sulphur dioxide (SO_2)	turns aqueous potassium dichromate(VI) from orange to green
